Parish & Community Connections

Samaritans is the welfare agency of the Anglican Diocese of Newcastle. It is the historic tradition of the Church to care for those in need. We are called to provide unconditional care, advocacy and support of the vulnerable.

As a member of the clergy, the Chaplain participates in the life of the church, and acts as a liaison between Samaritans and the church.



Pastoral Care

Pastoral Care is available to all staff and those we support and their families; whatever their faith or spirituality.

Pastoral Care is proactive in encouraging and strengthening resilience in the face of chronic and the sometimes unjust realities of living.

Pastoral Care is support in handling spiritual, personal, relationship or workplace issues.

This is a dimension of the holistic care provided because Samaritans is a Christian agency.

Pastoral Care includes visiting in the workplace, home or hospital. The Chaplain provides spiritual and religious support through funerals, confession, anointing, holy communion, marriage and baptism.

What does the Chaplain do?

- Provides Pastoral Care to all staff, volunteers and the people Samaritans supports (and their families).
 - Visits Samaritans services & activities.
 - Provides spiritual support, guidance and prayer to individuals and teams.
 - Provides support for staff following critical incidents including car accidents, violence, near death experiences etc.
 - Provides 'end of life', grief & loss education, reflection and support.
- Regularly preaches, and provides deputations to the parishes, and Church and community groups.
